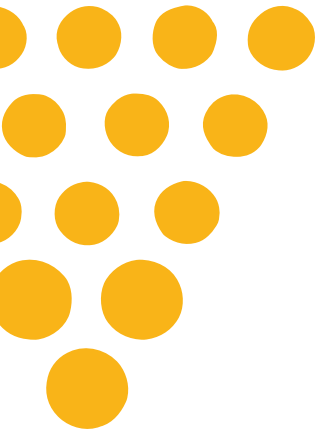

Starting our conversation about The Cornwall We Want

The Coronavirus pandemic has brought unprecedented challenges to Cornwall, the country and the entire World. The pandemic has affected virtually every aspect of how we live our lives, the health and wellbeing of our family and friends, our jobs, businesses and wider economy.

From the start, Cornwall Council has been working to keep the public informed and safe, to protect and care for the most vulnerable in our society and to support livelihoods in every way possible. This remains our top priority, but we are also determined that Cornwall should bounce forward - not just back - as we work together to build **The Cornwall We Want**.

This residents survey is just the start of the conversation, as we work to understand how the pandemic has affected our communities and to ask for your views on the future so that we can together build a more sustainable, healthy, safe, vibrant and inclusive future for us all.



Methodology



Using a representative sample of Cornwall's residents

500 Cornwall residents aged 18+ were interviewed between 23 May and 10 June 2020 by telephone. A **representative sample** was used which means that it reflects the population of Cornwall in terms of gender, age, region of Cornwall and socioeconomic status (see 'Respondent profile' at the end). Quotas were set for each using the latest population statistics.

- Potential respondents were called a minimum of 10 times before being disregarded
- Calls were made at various times of the day - including mornings, afternoons and evenings, and on weekdays and weekends - to ensure that individuals from a variety of demographics, life-stages and communities could be successfully reached
- If an interviewee was unable to participate in the survey immediately, they were given the opportunity to schedule the interview at a more convenient time for them

Making national comparisons

Wherever possible we have asked residents the same questions to those asked nationally, so that we can understand how Cornwall is being affected compared with elsewhere. Where available, national comparisons have been shown in black, using information taken from the following surveys:

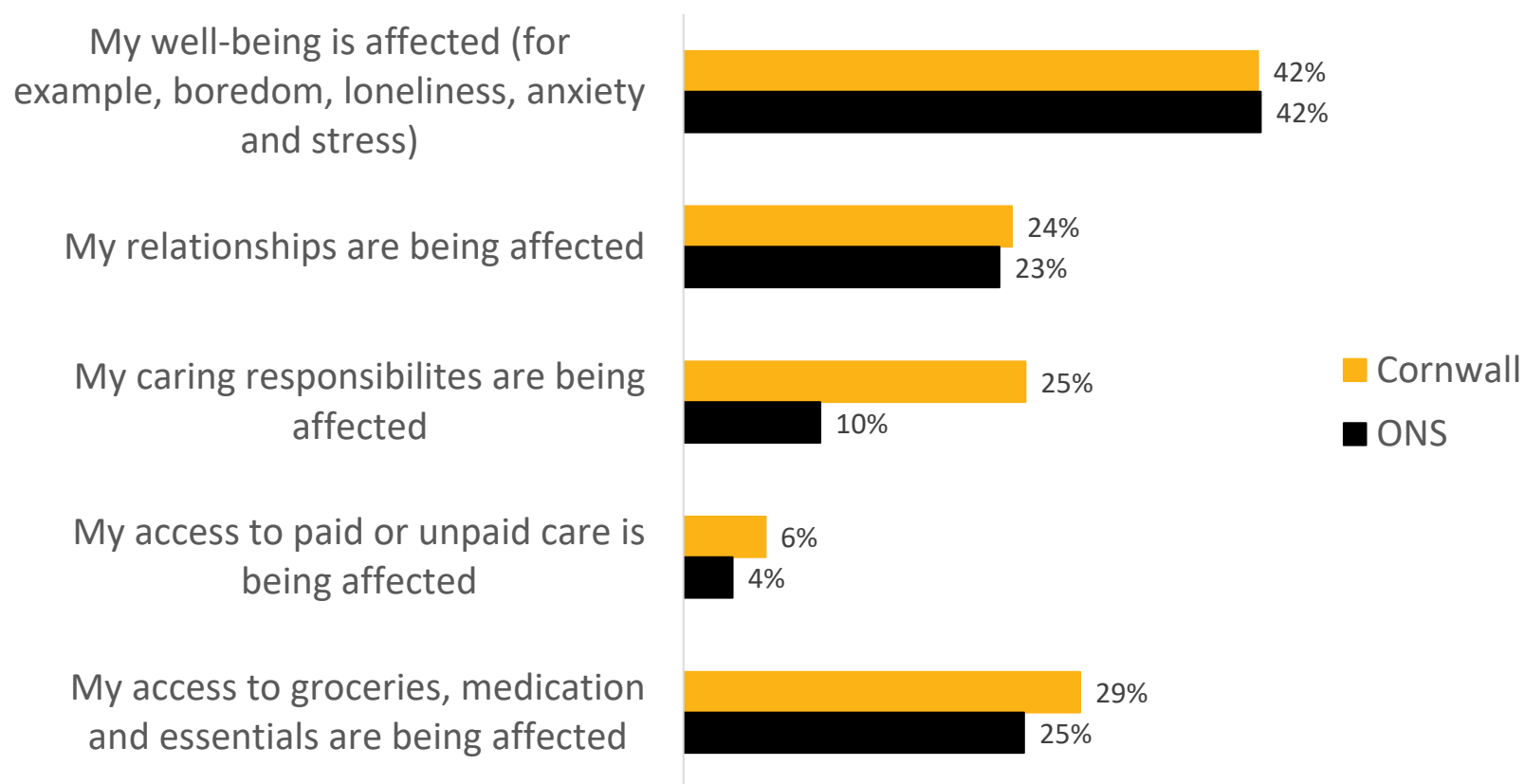
When comparing results, only differences equal to or greater than 4.3% are statistically valid

This survey has a **confidence interval of +/- 4.3%**, which means that, if it were practical to ask every member of Cornwall's population to take part, the true answer would be within 4.3% of the result obtained in this survey. **When comparing two results, this means that the difference must be equal to or greater than 4.3% to be statistically valid.**



Understanding the impact of the pandemic

Over two in five people say that their wellbeing has been adversely affected, with significantly more than the national average reporting their caring responsibilities are impacted

Residents aged 35-64 are more likely to say their caring responsibilities have been affected whilst those in the East are more likely to say their relationships have been affected

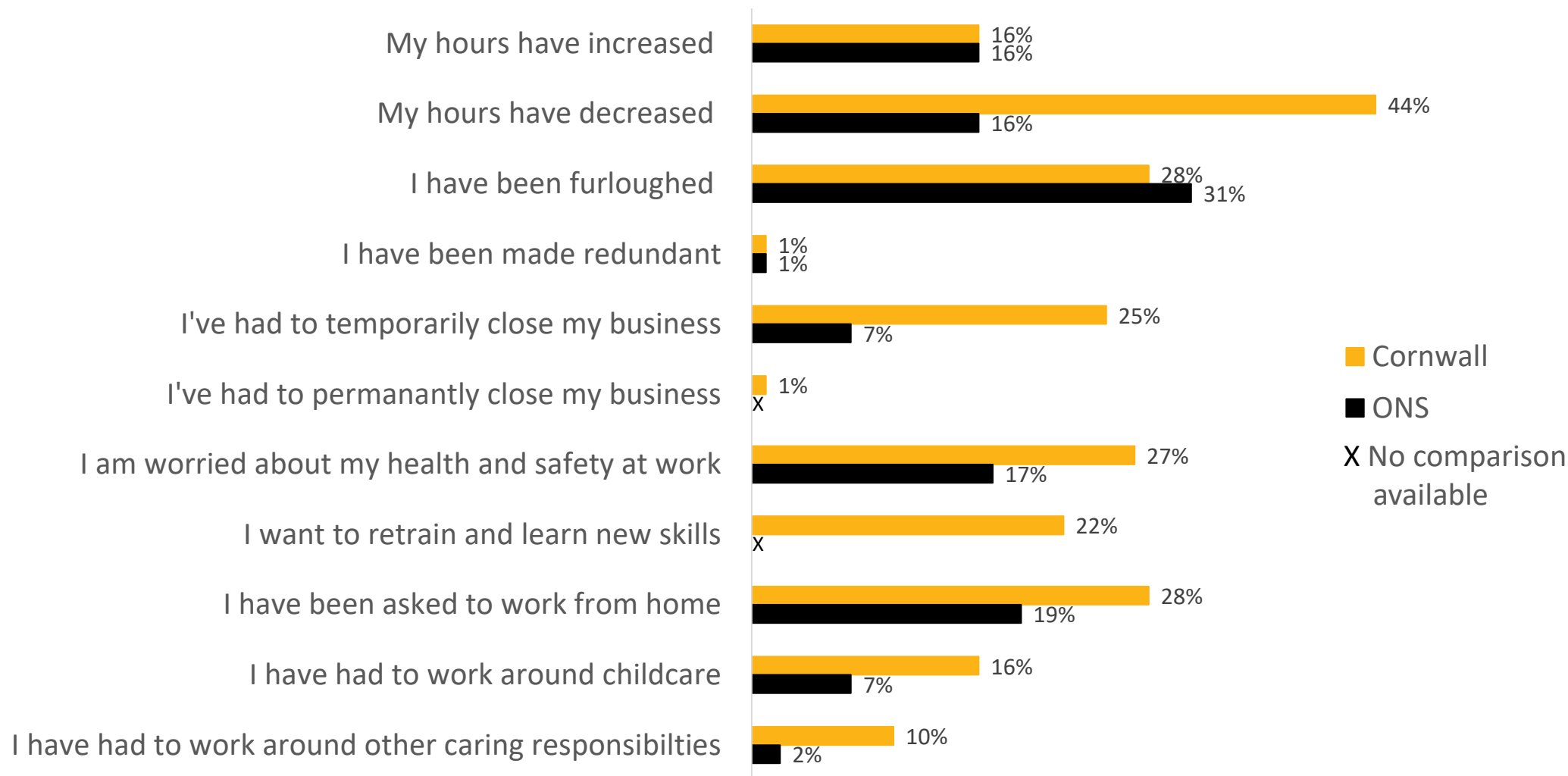

Many have seen their livelihoods disrupted by the pandemic, with 44% reporting their hours have decreased and a further 28% reporting they have been furloughed

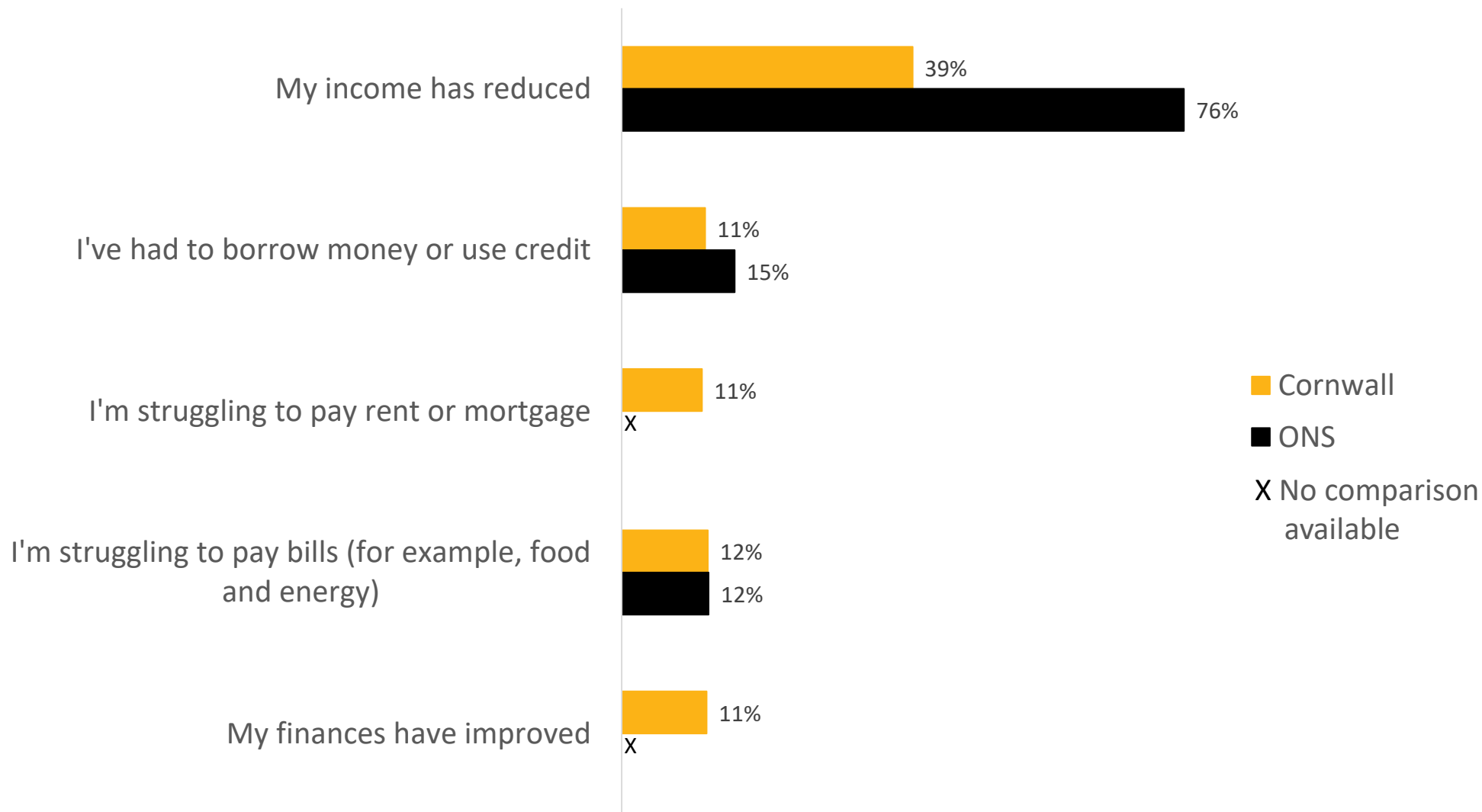

Almost two in five residents have seen their income reduce and more than one in ten are struggling to pay bills

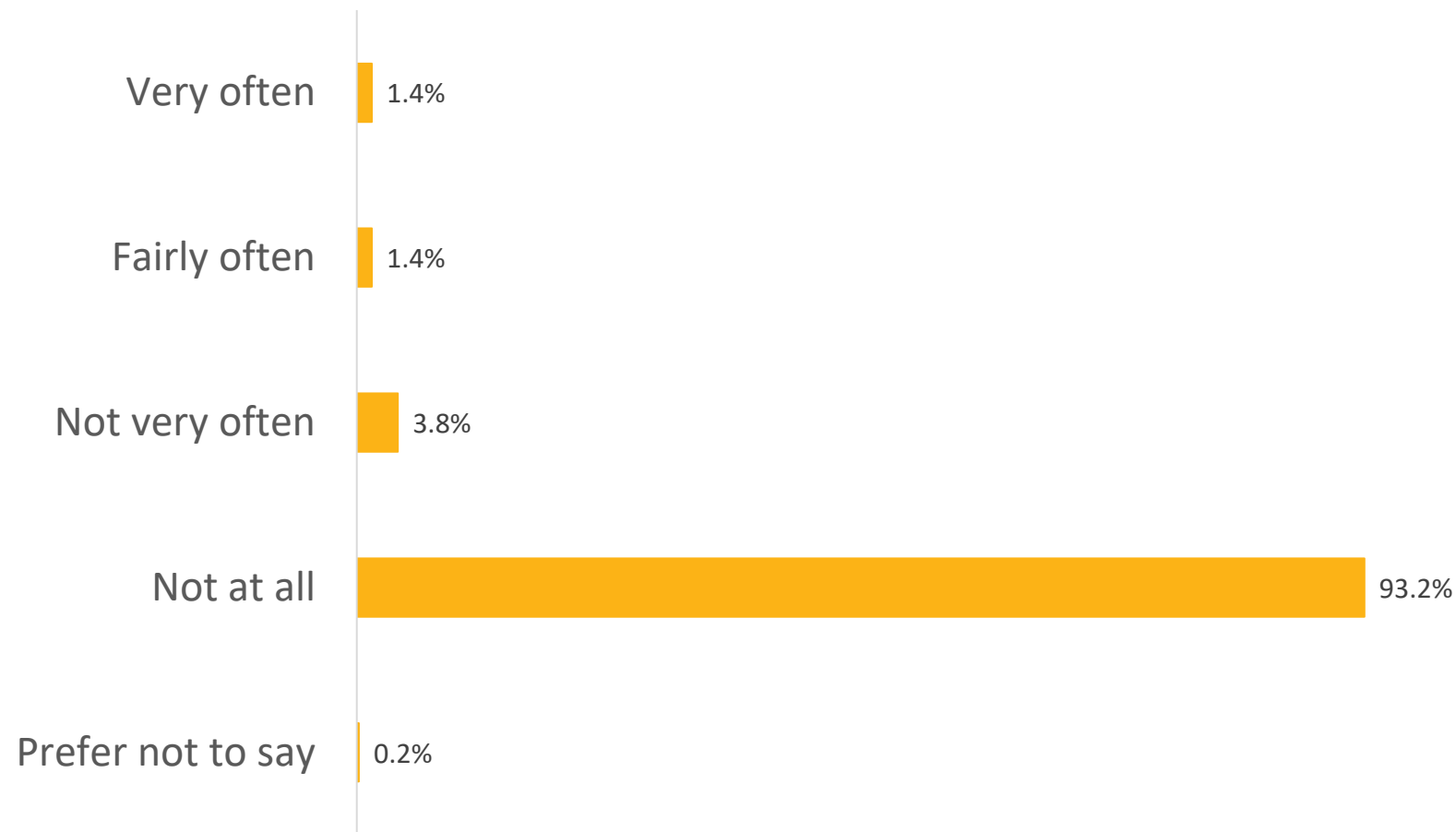

Almost 3% of residents say they have not always known where next meal is coming from or have eaten less than they need during the pandemic

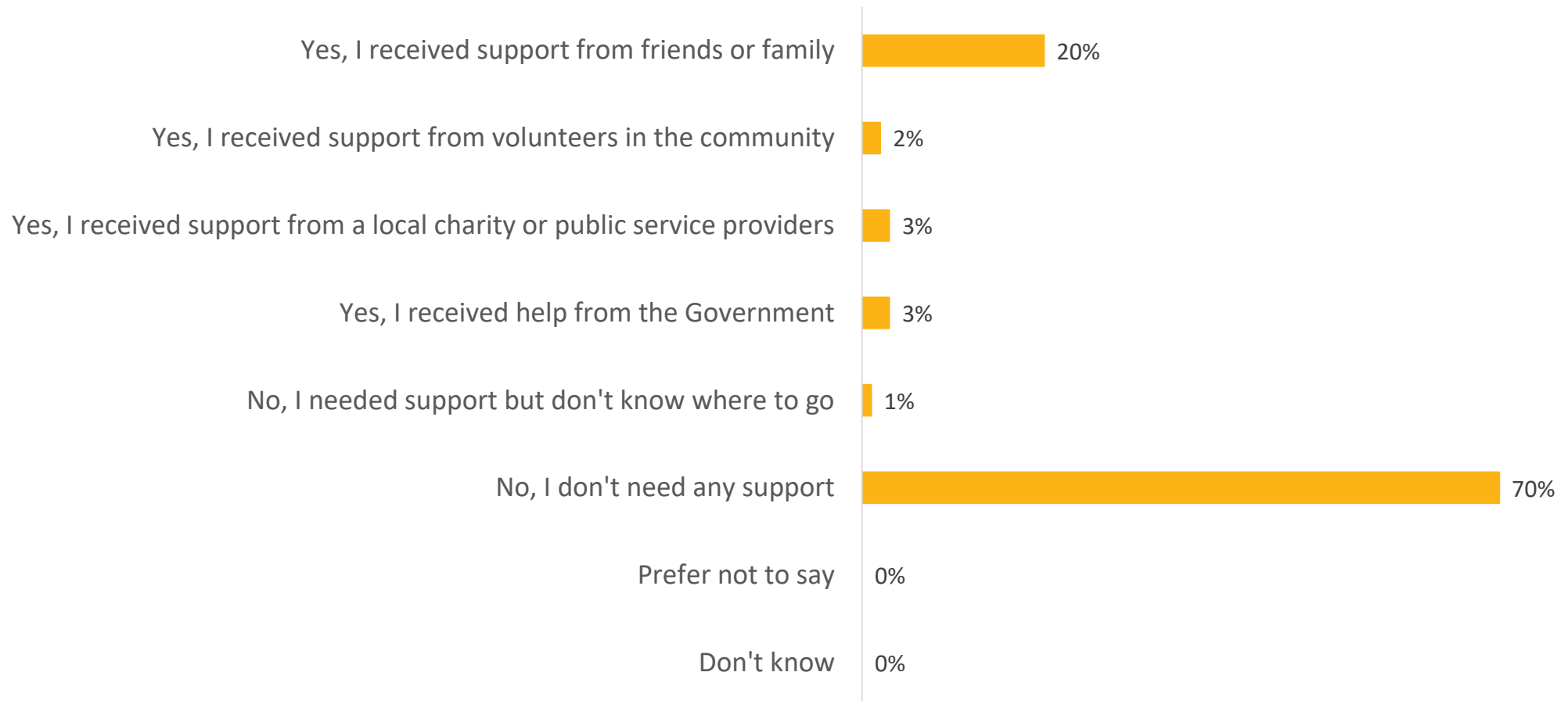


Question: During the pandemic, how often have you not known where your next meal is coming from, or eaten less than you need?

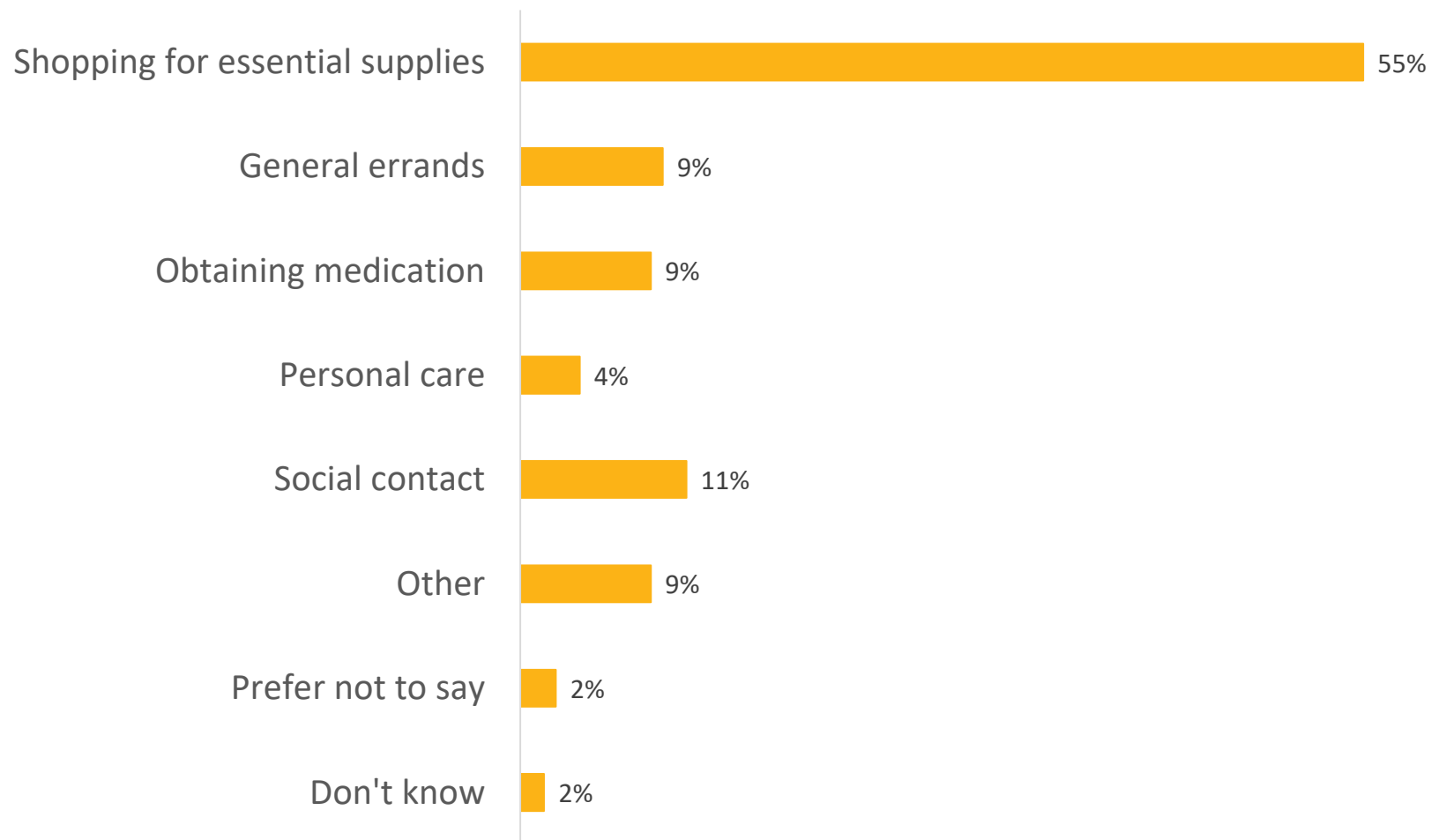

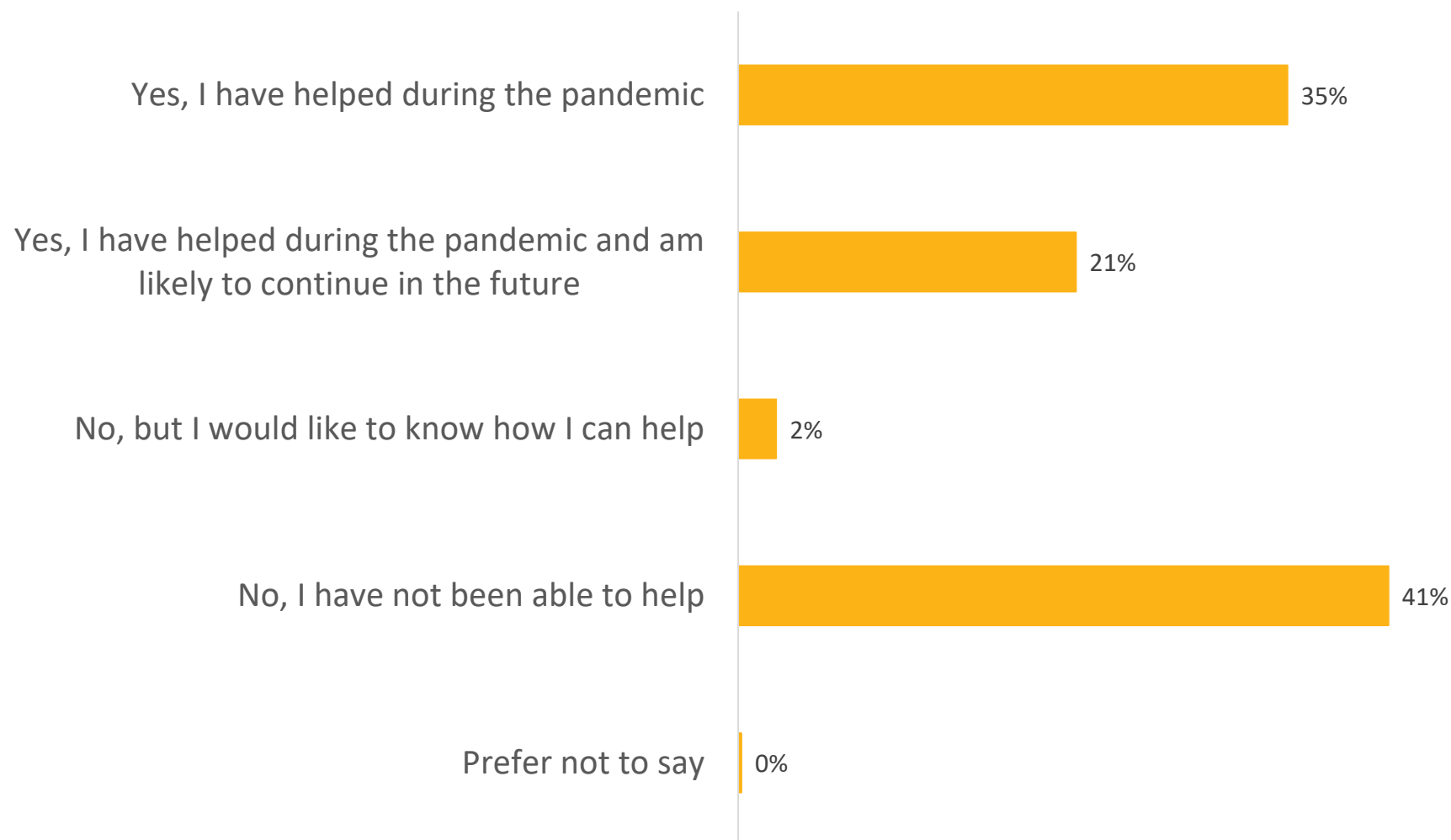

56% of residents have helped or supported others in the community, and one in five residents say they are likely to continue in the future

Younger residents are most likely to have helped during the pandemic, with women and those aged 35-64 most likely to continue supporting others after the pandemic is over

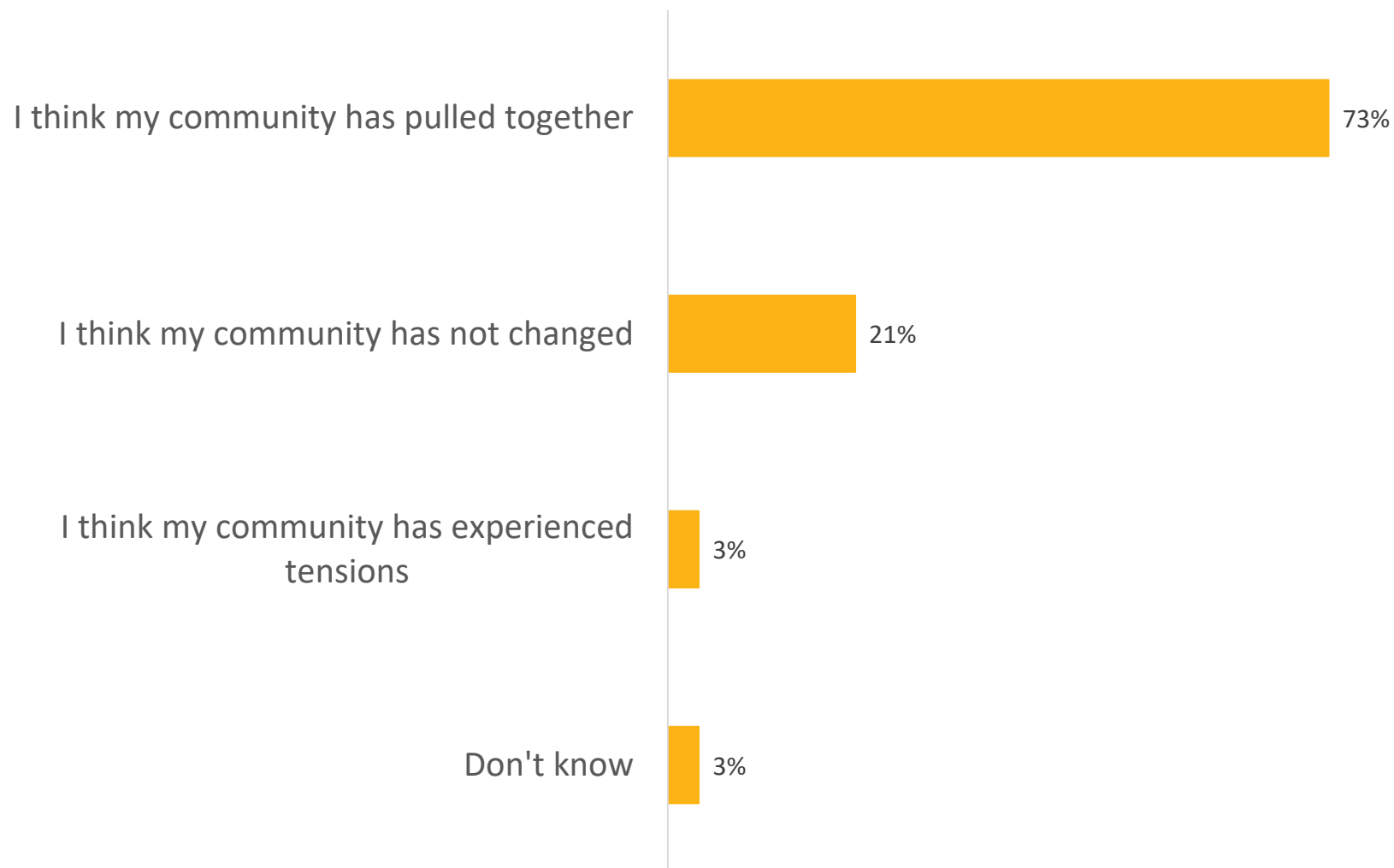

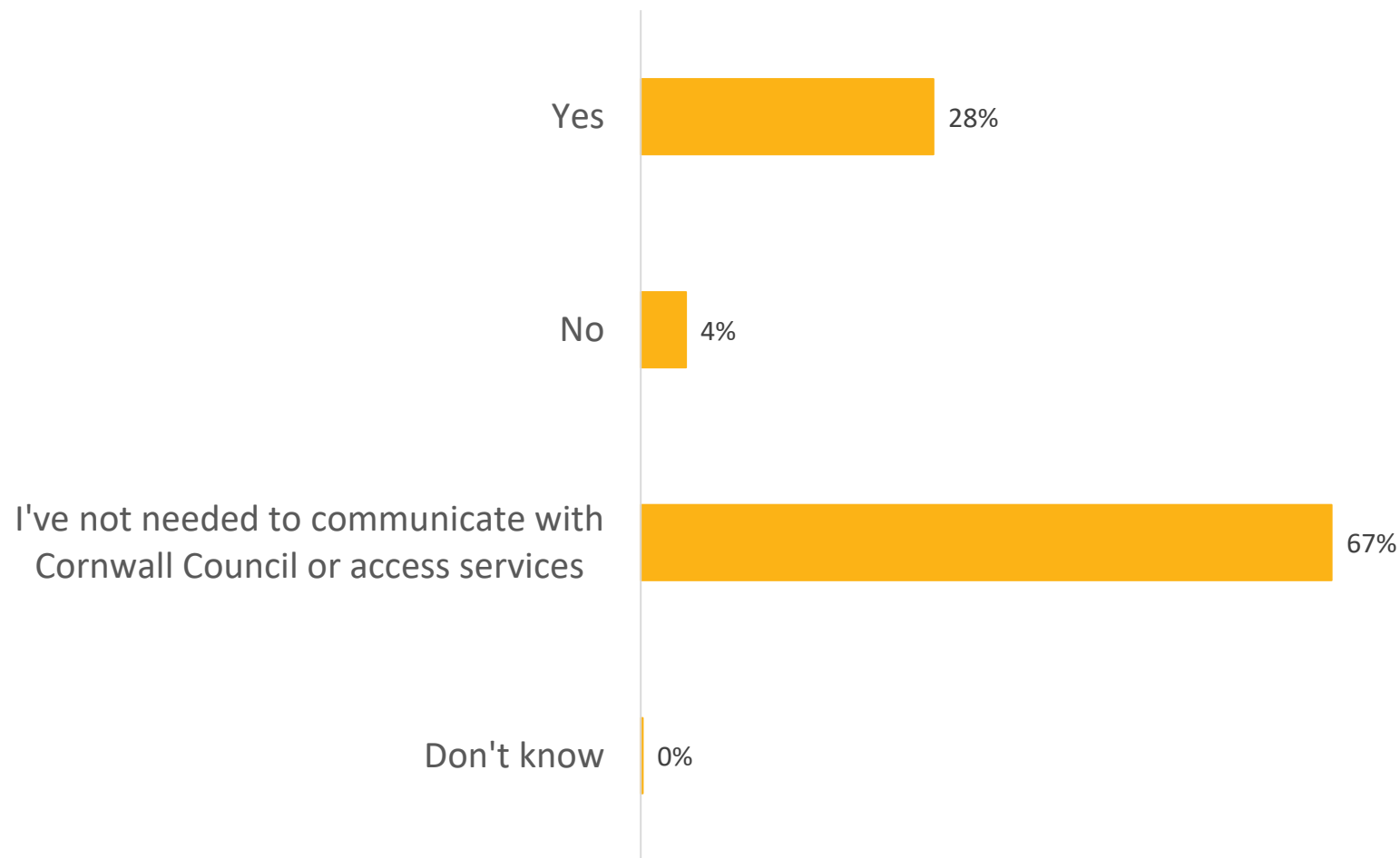

People living in East Cornwall are most likely to agree they could access the Council services they needed, those in the West are most likely to say they haven't needed to contact the Council

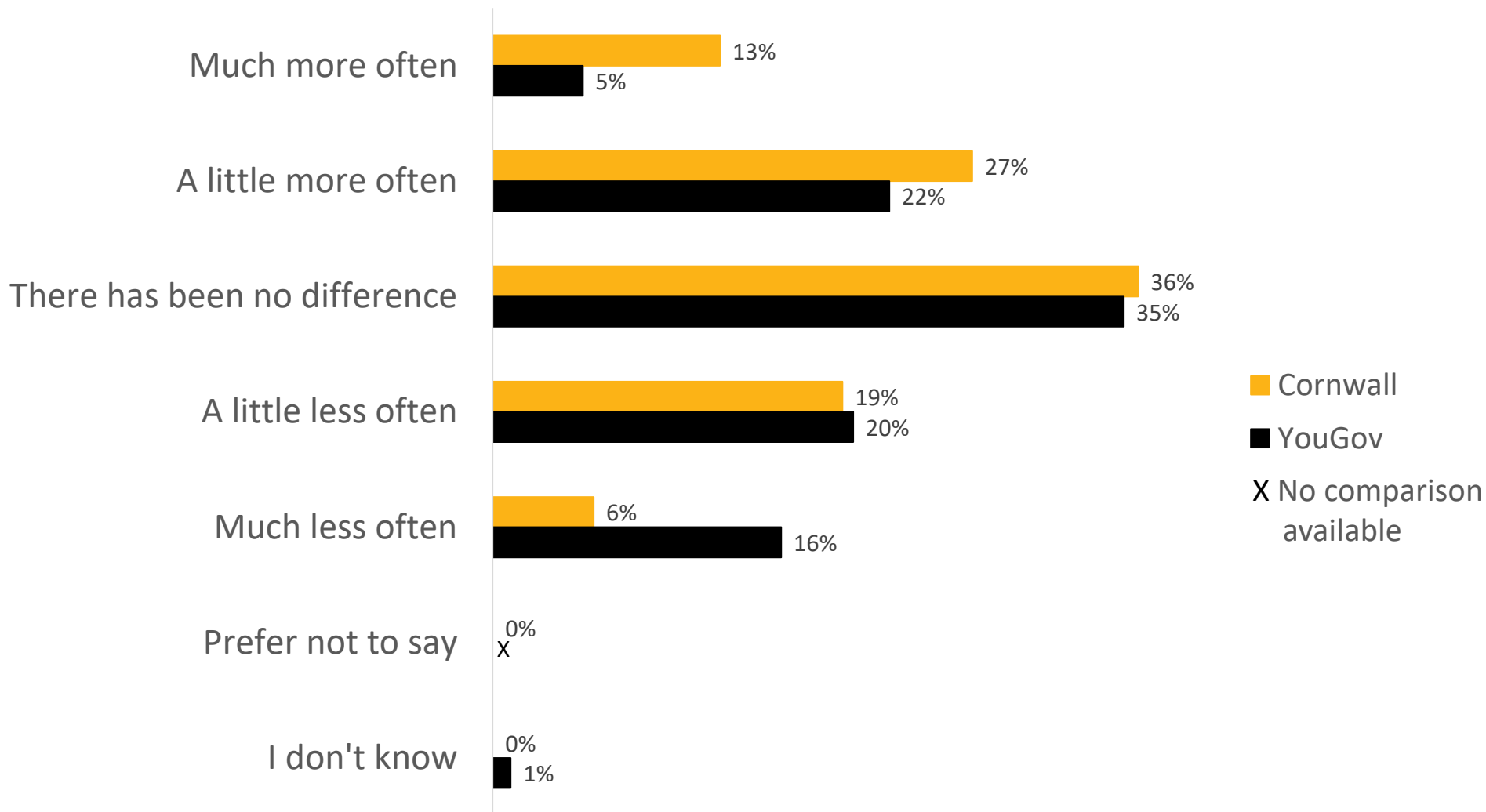

Women and those aged 35-64 are most likely to say they are exercising more often during the pandemic, whilst 18-34 year olds are more likely to say they exercise less often

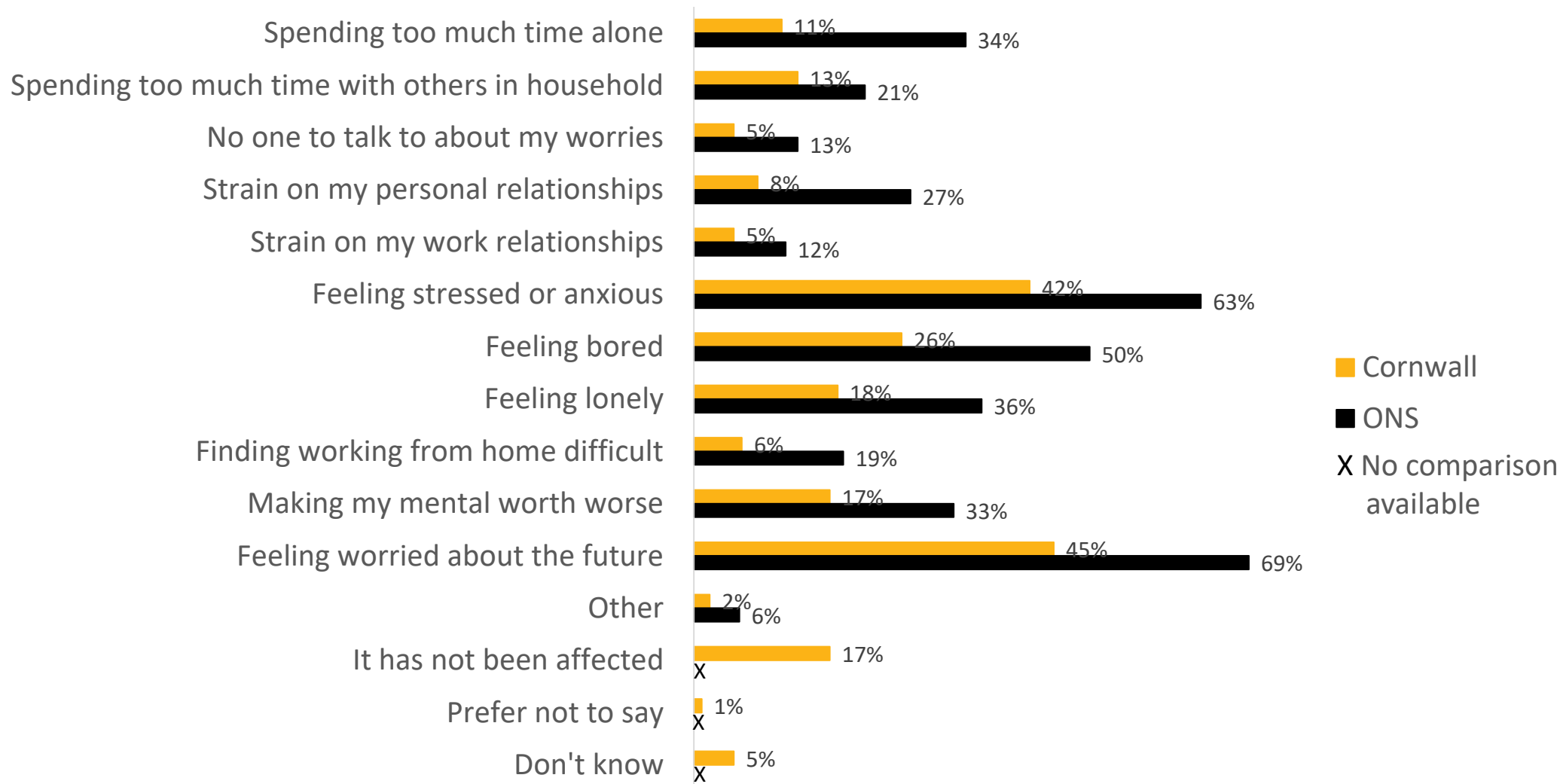

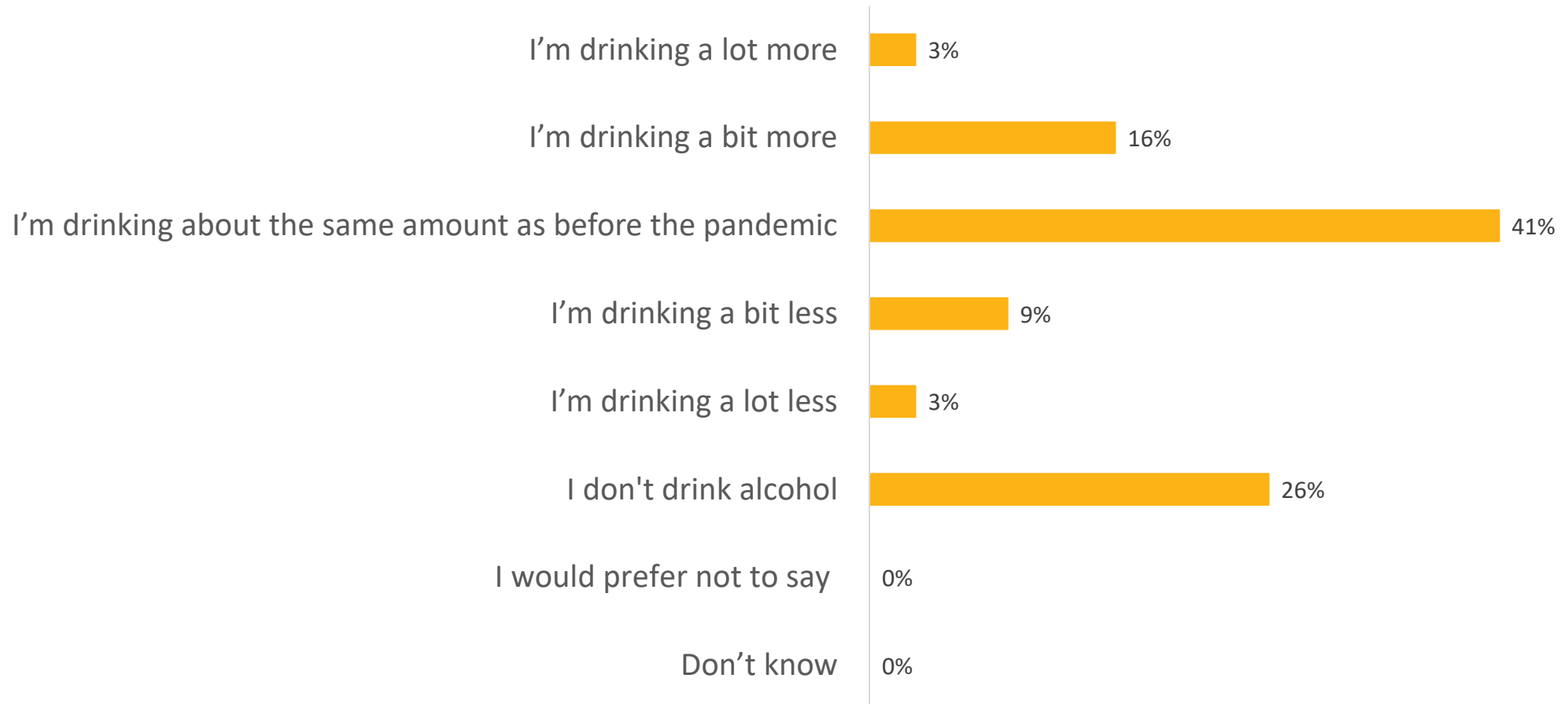

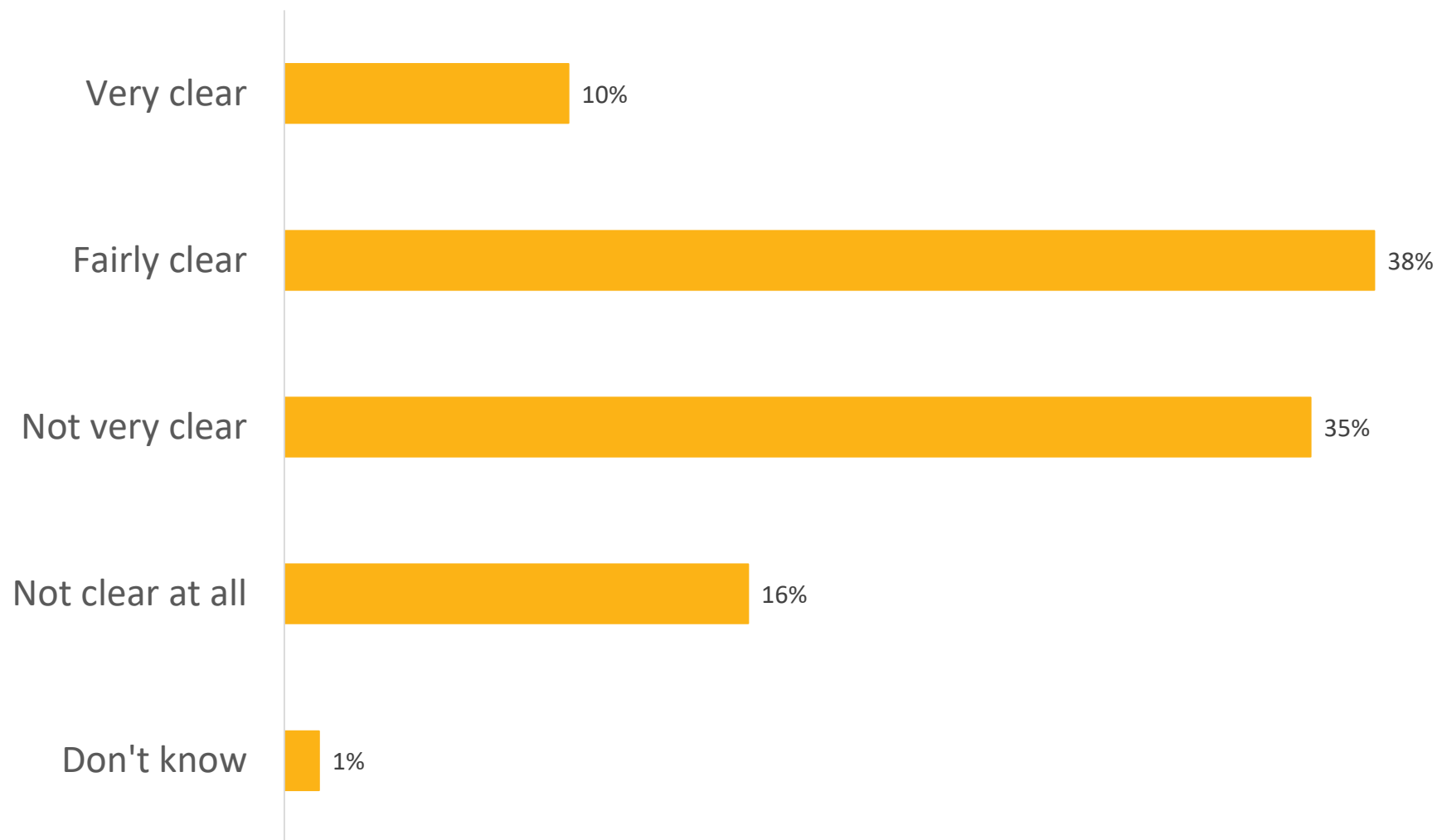

Residents disagreed on how clear the Government's messaging has been during the pandemic

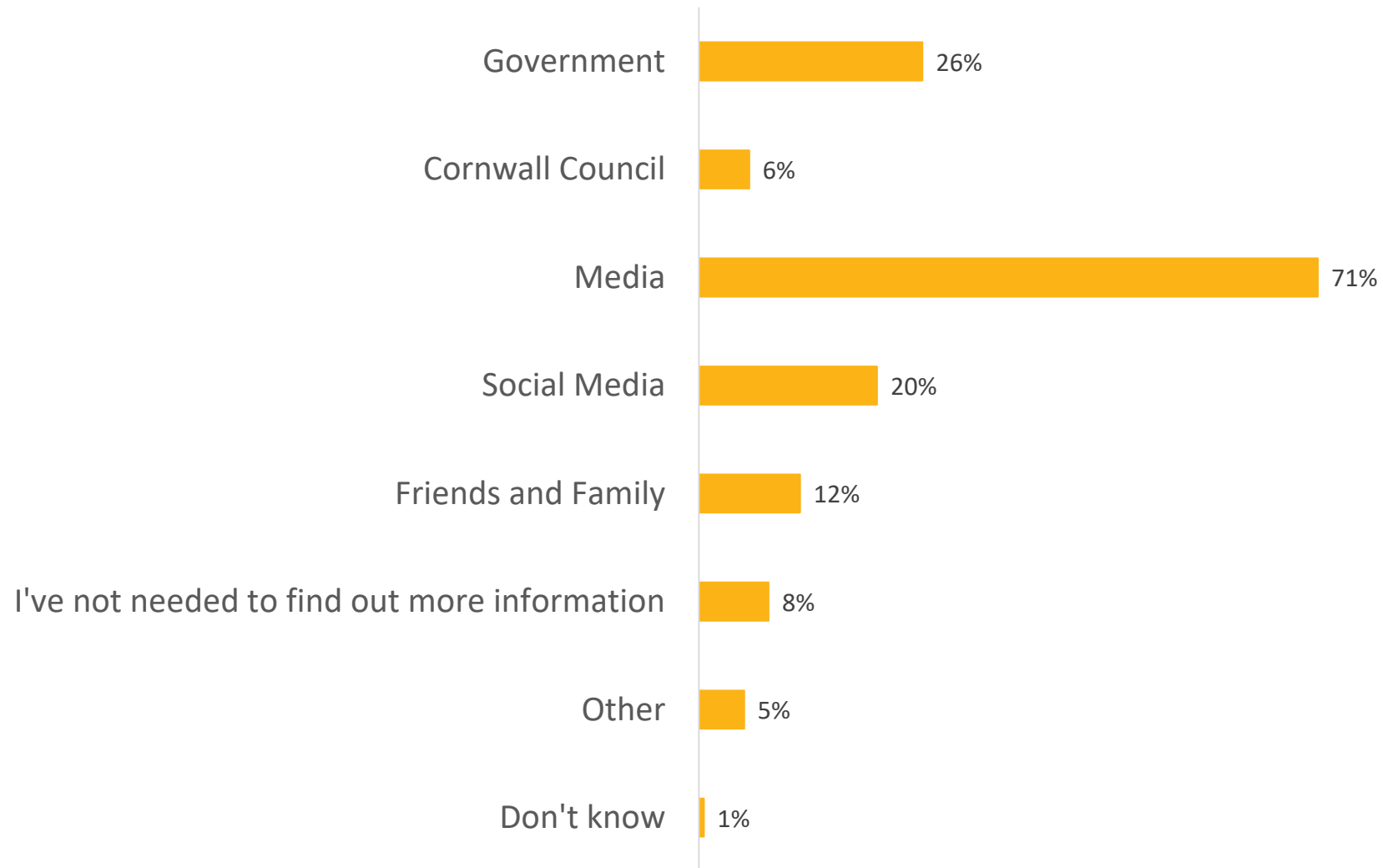


Question: How clear, if at all, has the government's message on the next steps of easing out of lockdown been?

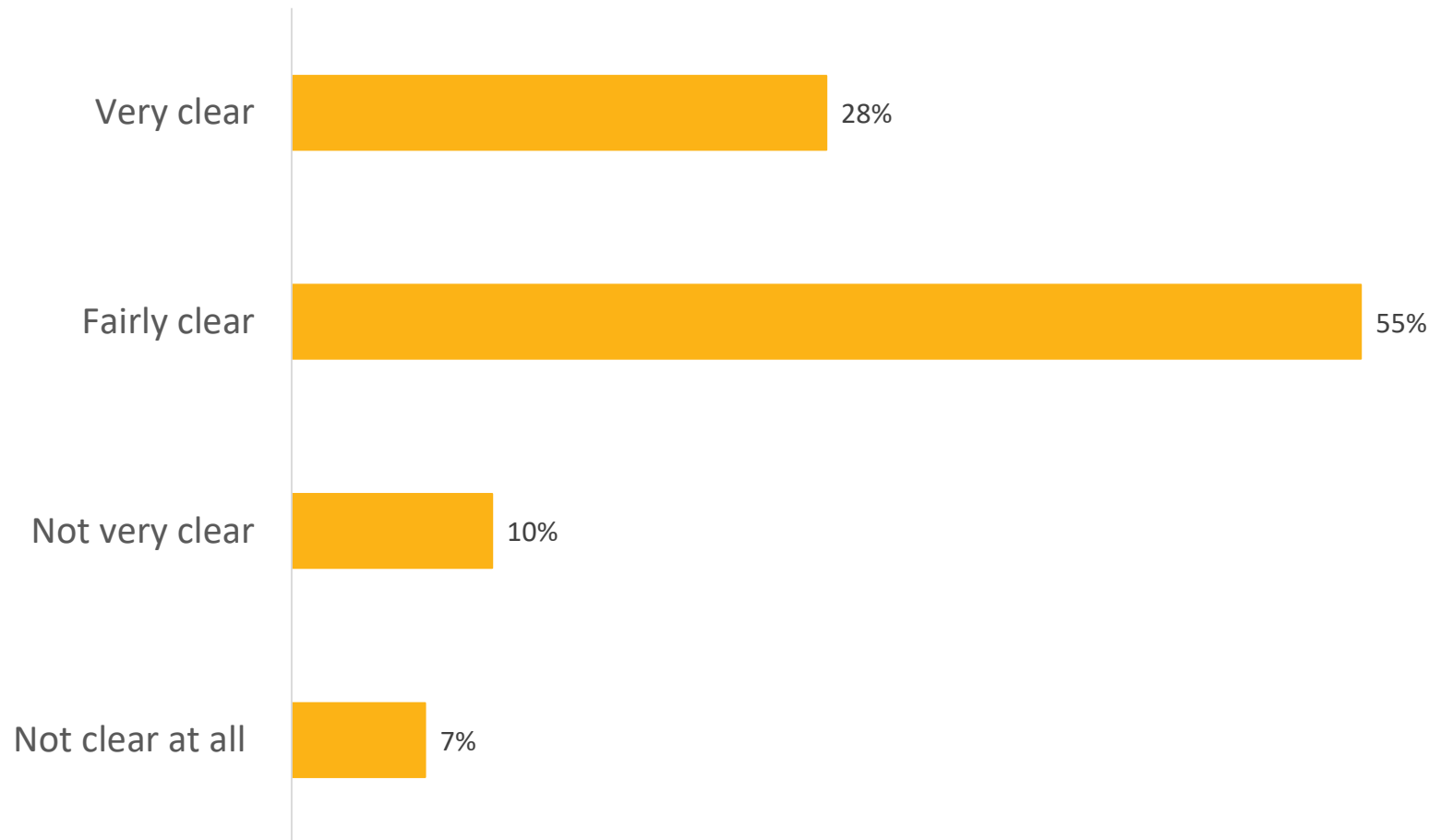

Question: If the answer was Cornwall Council, was the information provided...

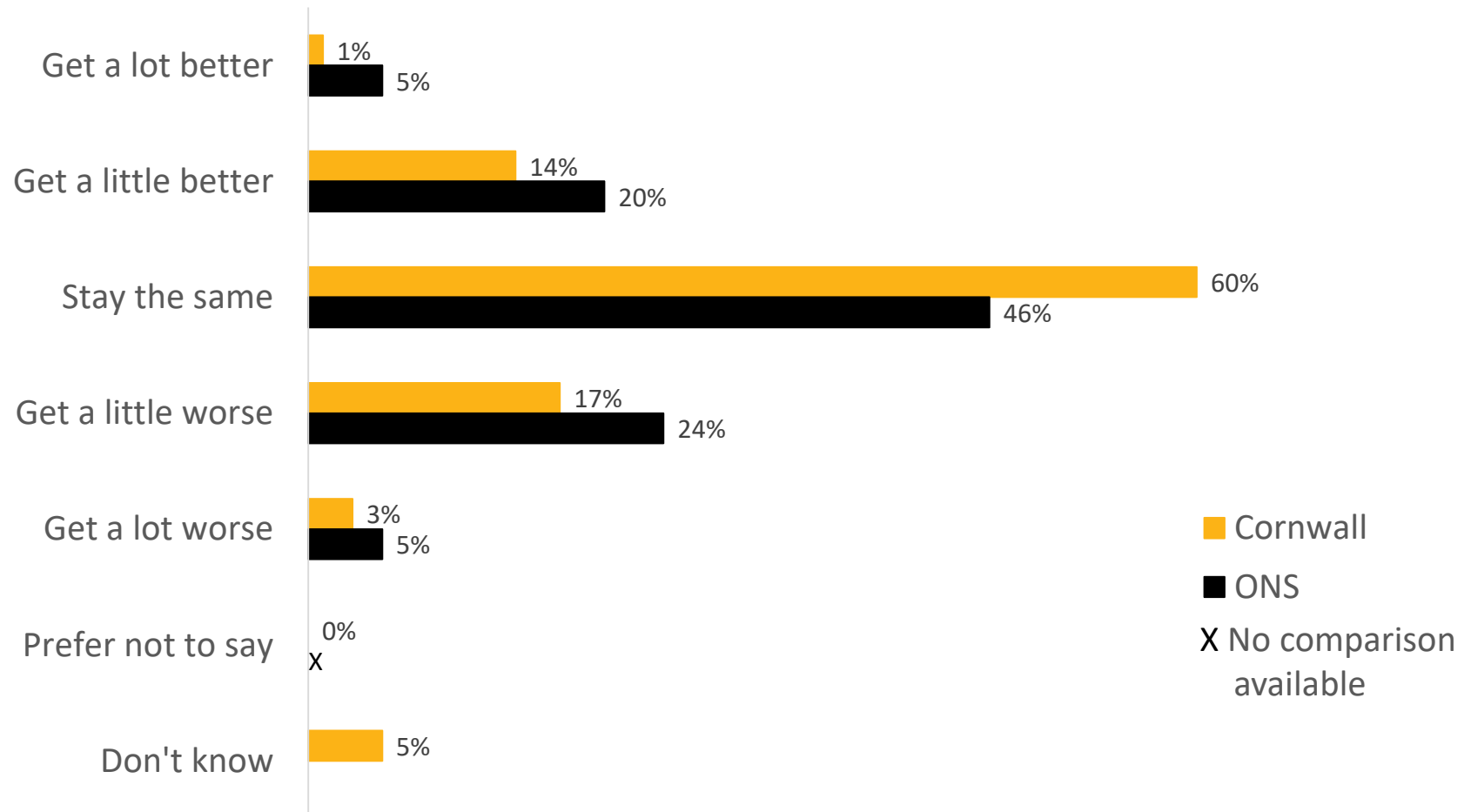

Views for the future

The majority of residents expect their financial position to remain the same over the next 12 months, with smaller but equal portions feeling it will get better or worse

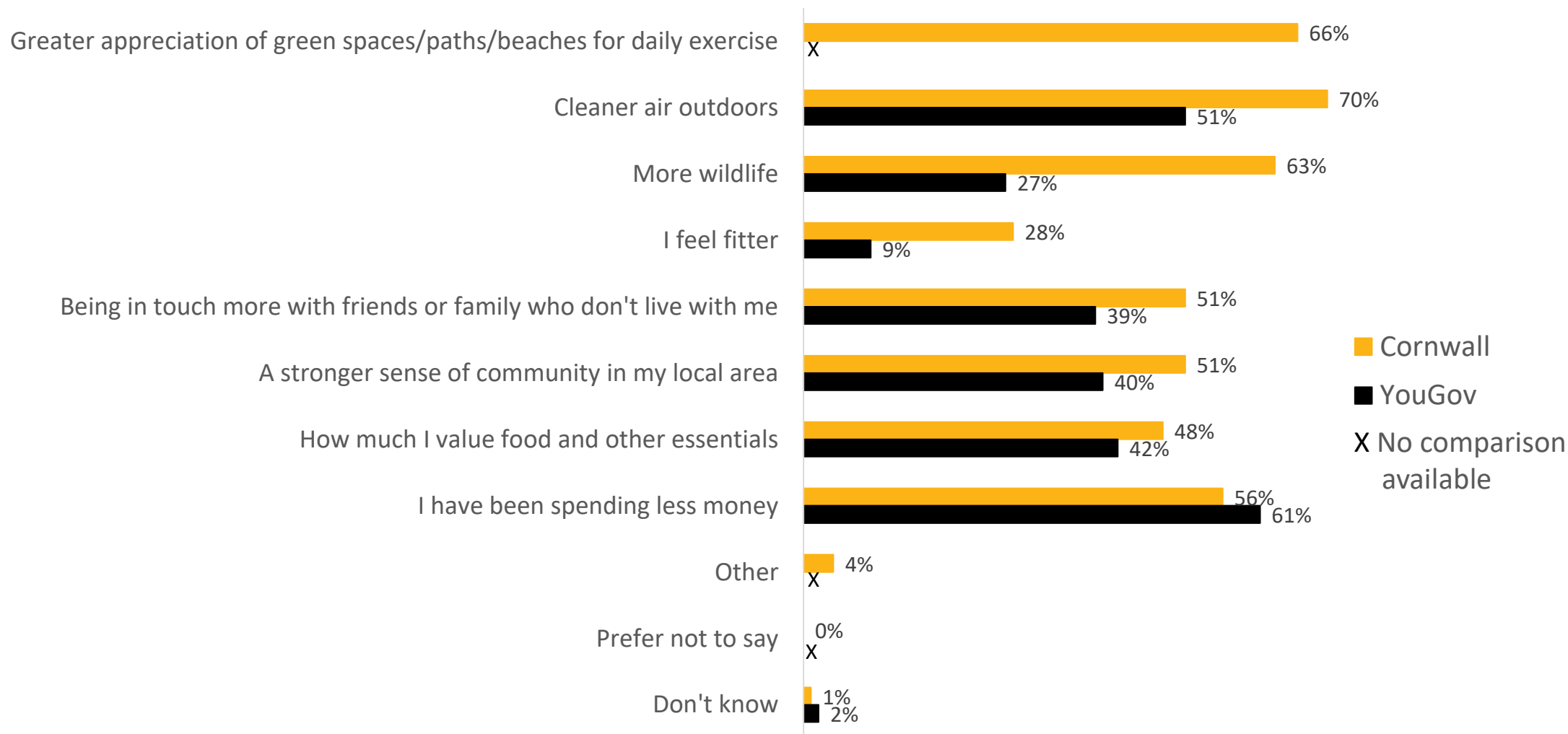

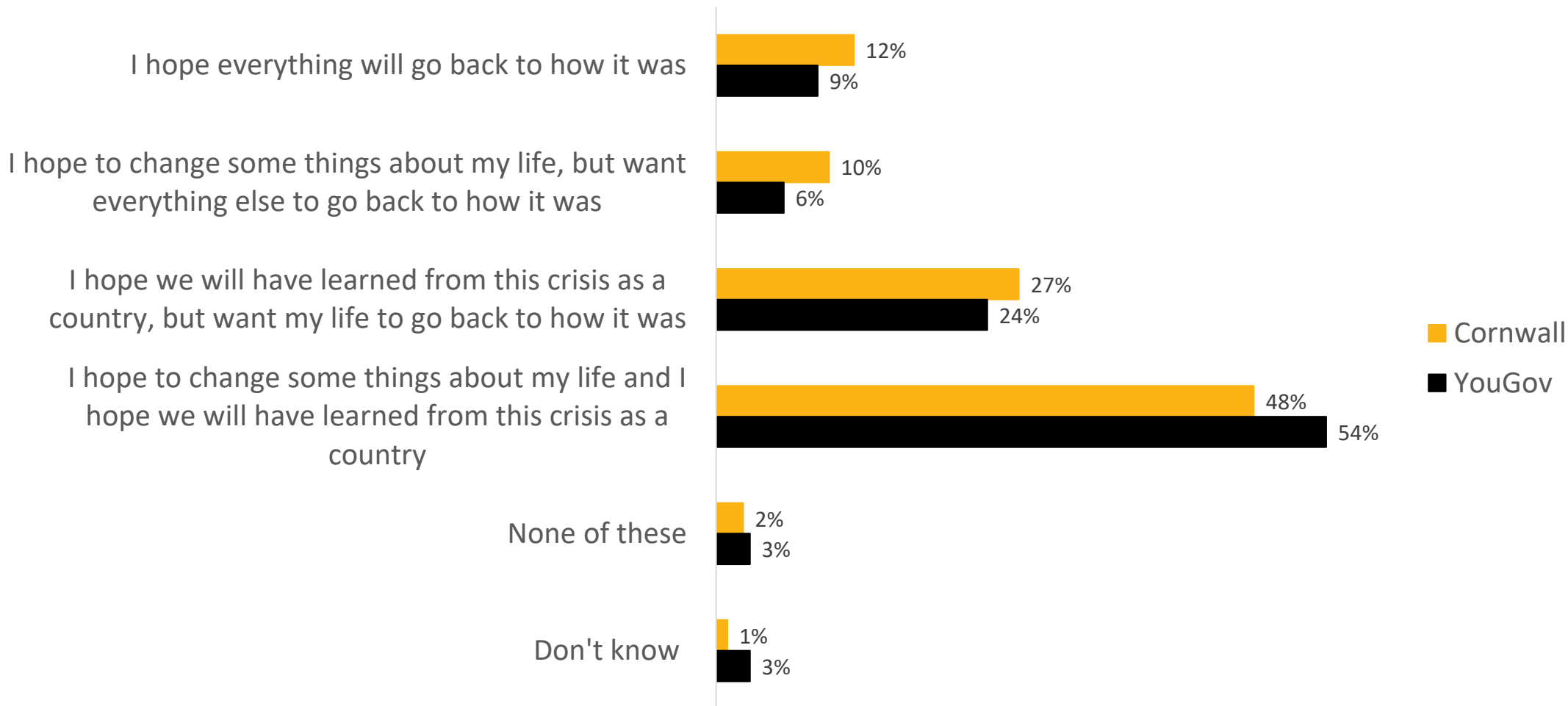

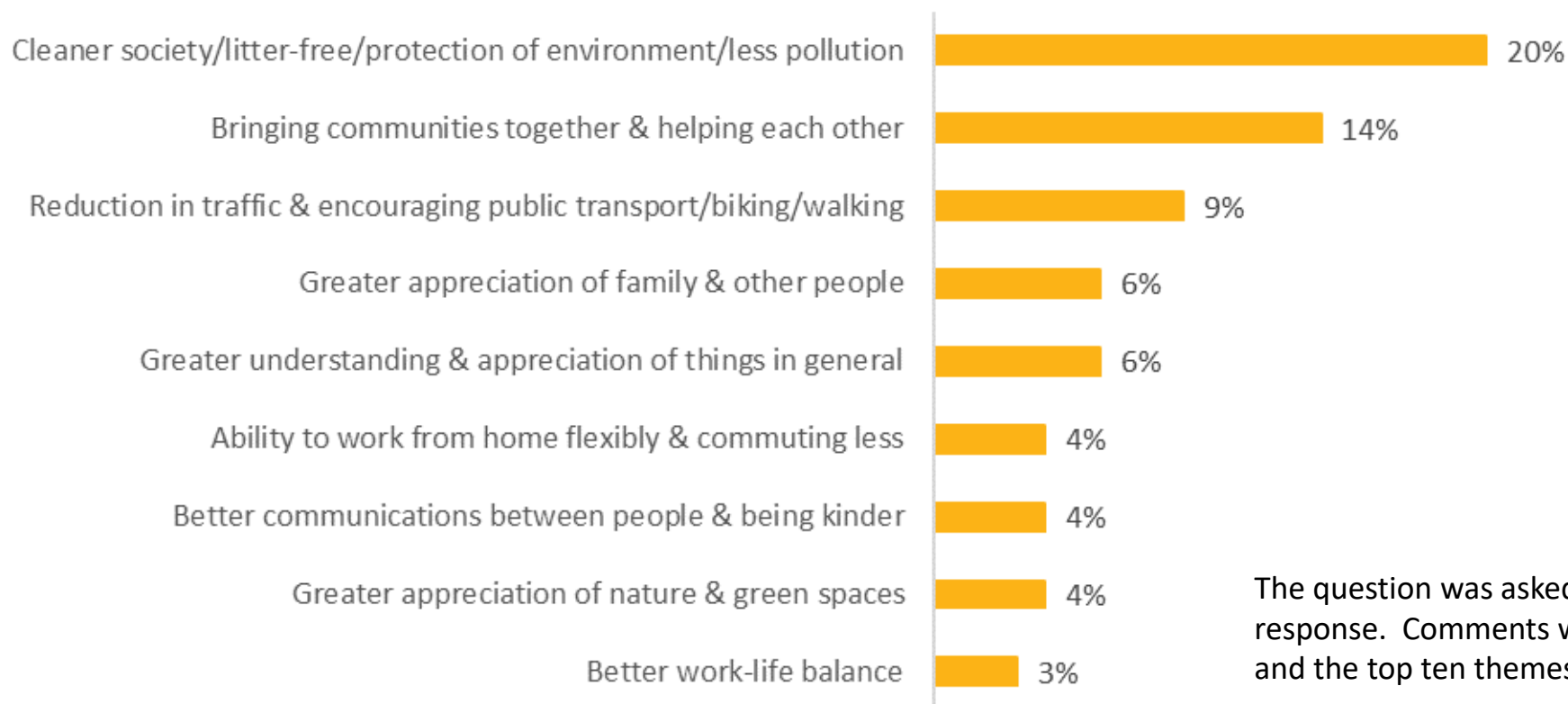

When asked what one thing people would like to see changed once the pandemic is over, a cleaner environment, closer communities and reduced traffic were the most mentioned topics



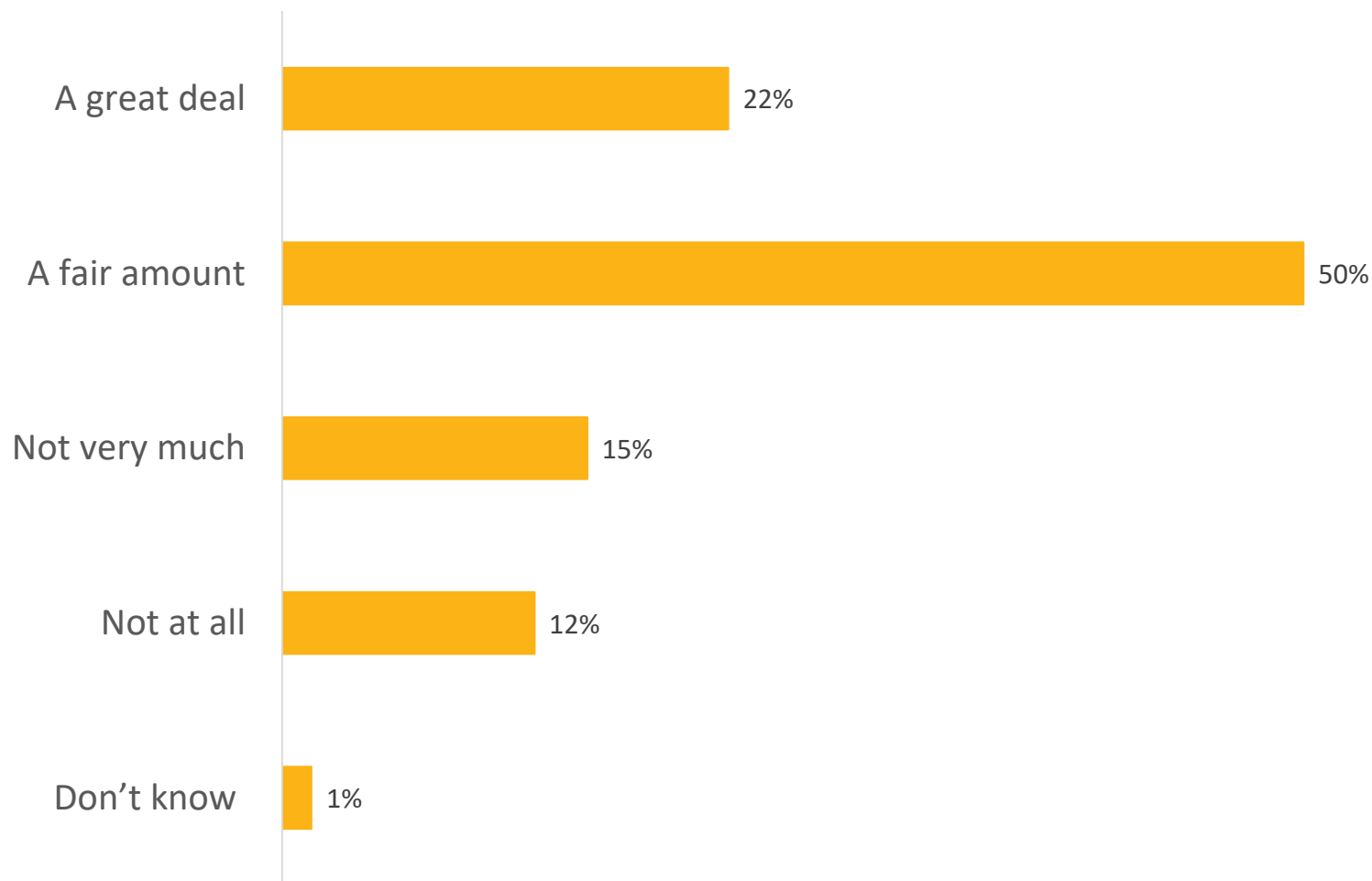

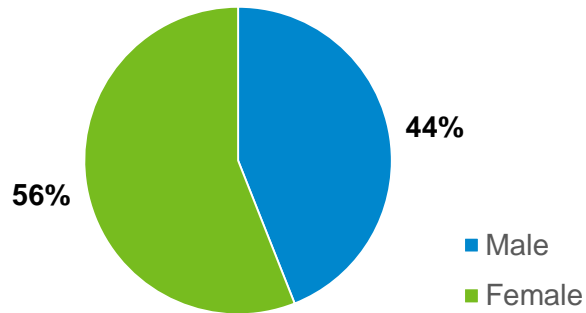

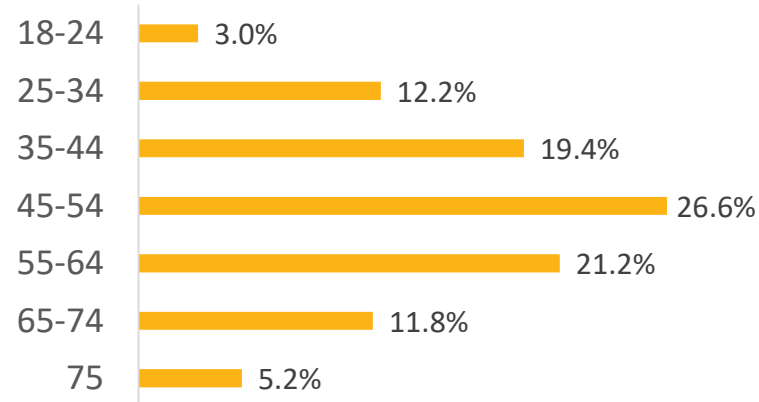

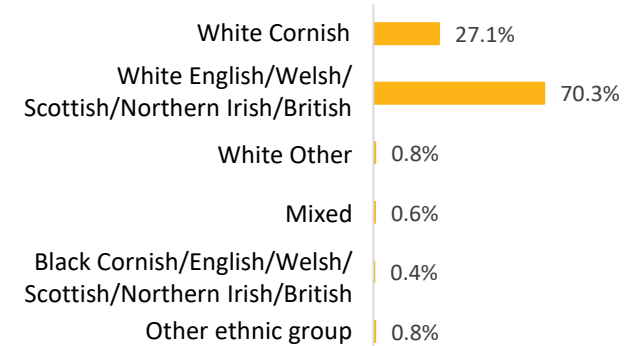

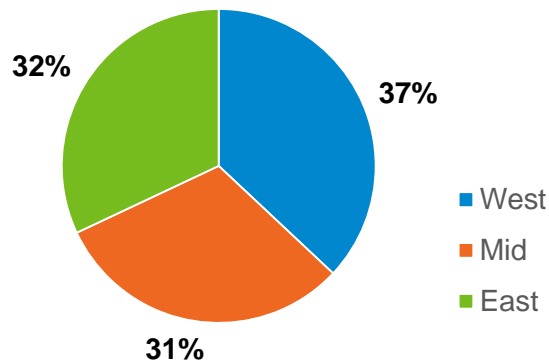

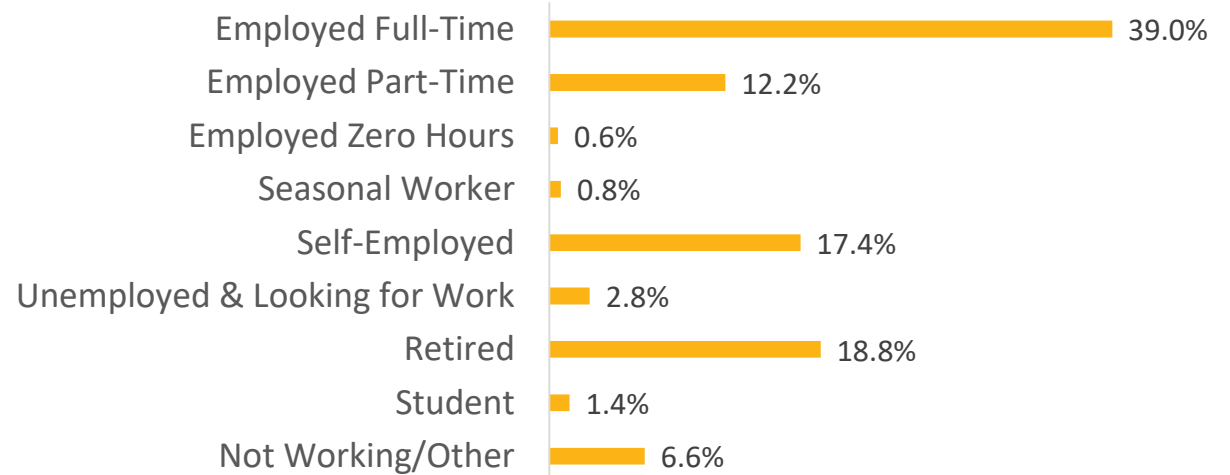

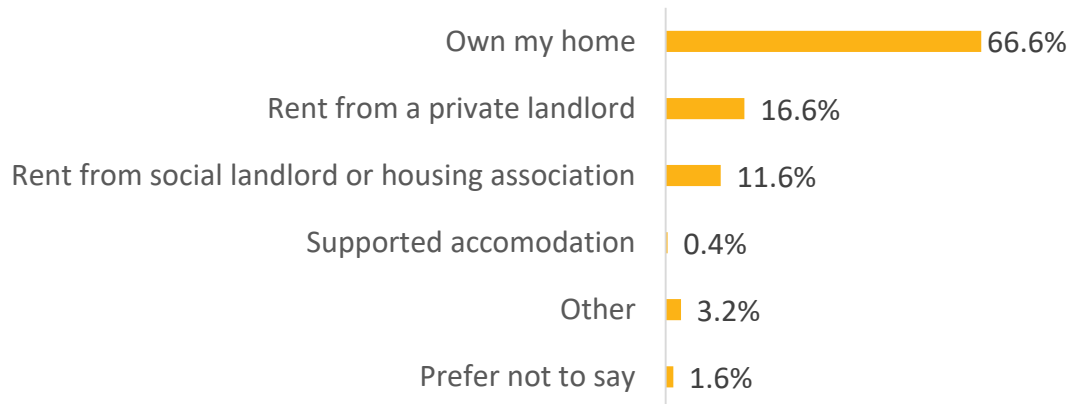

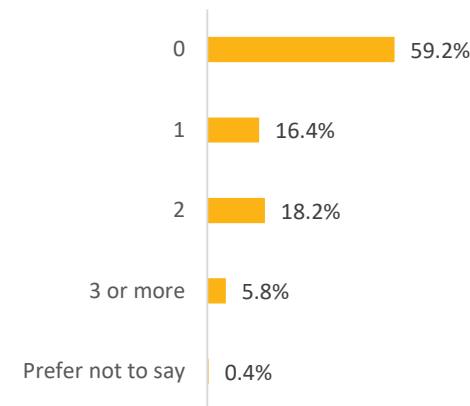

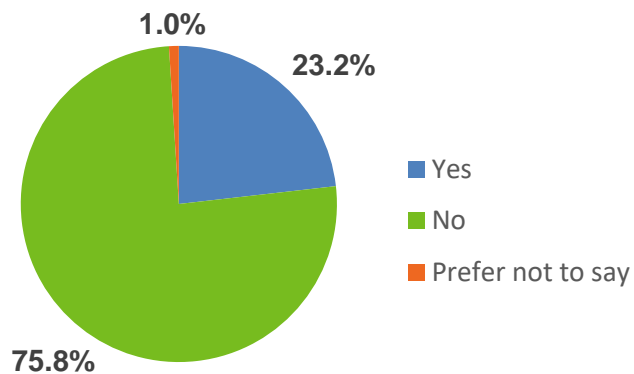

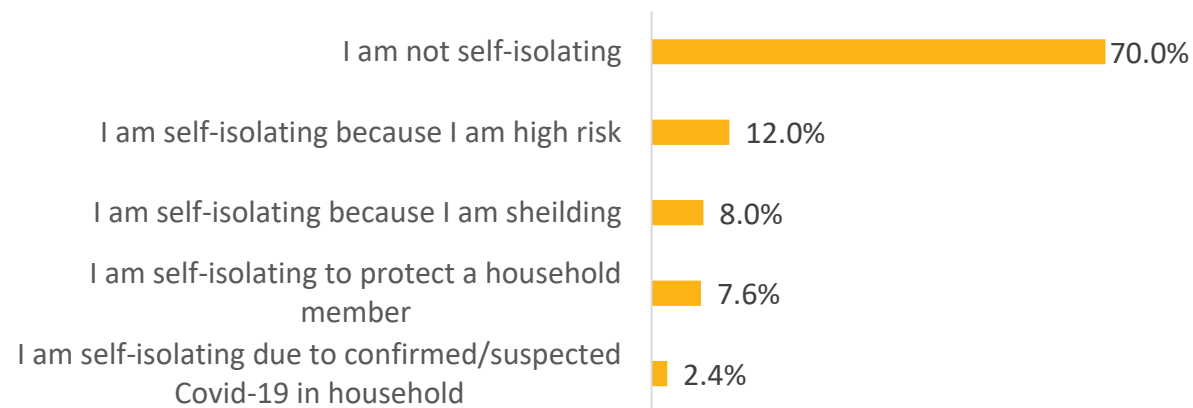
Number of children in household

Interpretation of findings

This report contains tables, infographics and charts. In some instances, the responses may not add up to 100%. There are several reasons why this might happen:

- The question may have allowed each respondent to give more than one answer
- Only the most common responses may be shown in the table or chart
- Individual percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number so the total may come to 99% or 101%
- A response of between 0% and 0.5% will be shown as 0%.

Subgroup analysis has been undertaken by gender, age group, ethnicity and area.

For the analysis of some questions, some response options have been grouped together to provide a level of agreement or satisfaction. For example, 'Strongly agree' and 'Tend to agree' have been grouped and shown as 'Agree', and 'Very satisfied' and 'Fairly satisfied' have been grouped as 'Satisfied'.
